SERVICE TO THE COMMUNITY

Community Gardens

Blue-Star Memorial Garden at Shadowlawn Pocket Park (ongoing). Designed, planted, and dedicated in 2011. The garden is maintained by members as part of the Shadowlawn Pocket Park.

Claire Brownell Memorial Wildflower Garden (ongoing). Members redesigned a native wildflower garden located at the historic Reeve House, restoring and maintaining the back slope with native plants. Located at Mountain Ave. in Westfield.

Miller-Cory House Museum (ongoing). Members maintain period gardens of the colonial era that were designed and planted by the Club in 2004. Located at Mountain Ave. in Westfield.

Mindowaskin Park (ongoing). Members provide seasonal plantings and maintain the flower urns at the entrance of the central town park. Located at East Broad St. in Westfield.

Shadowlawn Park (ongoing). Established, designed, and planted by the Club in 2004, this small public garden serves as home to the Blue Star Memorial marker. It also is home to a certified Butterfly Garden, planted in 2013 by our Juniors, and it continues to be maintained by them. Located at the corner of Shadowlawn and Rahway Ave. in Westfield.

Community Projects

Jardine Academy. Twice annually, a children's book is donated and chosen as theme for holiday tree ornaments made by members. Members decorate the tree with hand-made ornaments, and when possible, interact with the students. Mother's Day planters, seasonal crafts and planting are also done with the students. Located in Cranford.

Veterans. (seasonal & ad-hoc). Over the years numerous club projects have benefited our Veterans. This year we will support Menlo Park Veterans Home. We will plant bulbs in the fall and provide seasonal flowers, in winter and spring. Veterans' Day cards, signed by club members, will be sent to the home in November.

Mobile Meals. (3 times per year). Members make small floral designs to place on meal trays for Mobile Meals delivered to elderly and home-bound Westfield residents. Workshops are at the First Baptist Church on Elm St. in Westfield.



SERVICE TO MEMBERS

A large part of service within our club (and ultimately the community at large) is the education of our members in gardening, flower design, the environment, and community service. This is achieved through monthly programs, certification through courses sponsored by the GCNJ and NGC, recognition awards, and committee activities from the various interest groups within the Club. Annual Recognition Awards encourage club participation, while Education Awards and accreditation through State and National programs encourage members to learn, expand their experience, and share with members.

A favorite, longstanding club tradition is selection of a Bird- and Wildflower-of-the-Year. Members are encouraged to attract or plant these natives to their gardens.

Bird of the Year

Wild Turkey (Meleagris gallopavo)

Once restricted to the eastern and southeastern United States, turkey populations declined from overhunting but have rebounded and are now established well to the north and west of their original range.

Turkeys are birds of open woodland but also can be found in fairly dense forest and scrub. Males are larger than females with a "beard" hanging from their breast. The male size is 46" and the female 37".

Turkeys feed on the ground on just about anything then return to the trees for their night roosts. The Wild Turkey and the Muscovy Duck are the only birds native to the Americas that have been domesticated and transported worldwide. The male Wild Turkey's familiar gobble call attracts females from a distance and repels competing males.

Baby wild turkeys are called chicks. They are active right after hatching and can walk within a short time. Within 12-24 hours, they typically leave the nest and can fly short distances after 8-14 days.

Wildflower of the Year

Butterfly Weed (Asclepias tuberosa)

'Butterfly Weed', or *Asclepias tuberosa*, is a native perennial, with widespread distribution in the eastern third of the US, extending west to Texas and Minnesota. In a sunny location, this member of the milkweed family grows in most soils. It is a relatively tall (1-2ft), erect plant that adds both structure and bright orange color to the perennial garden from mid to late summer. In the fall, its attractive seed pods add further interest. *A. tuberosa* can be distinguished from similar members of the milkweed family by its hairy stems and lack of milky sap. *A. tuberosa* has nectar-rich flowers born on wide umbels, an important food source for many pollinators, including butterflies, moths, native bees, wasps, and even hummingbirds. While not the favorite food source for the monarch, its catepillars can be raised on the plant. Butterfly weed does not transplant well. Best propagation is by seed, which unlike most related species, does not require stratification to germinate.

Of historical note [from Wikipedia], native Americans and European pioneers boiled the roots and used them to treat diarrhea and respiratory illnesses. Young seed pods were used as food after being boiled in several changes of water to remove toxic substances, and down from the pods was spun and used to make candle wicks.
